Services for Bill Cook were held Thursday, August 25, 1983 at the United Methodist-Presbyterian Church in Rifle. Rev. R. W. Foster and Rev. Lynn Evans officiated. The Sowder Funderal Home was in charge of arrangements.

William Edward Cook was born on February 6, 1925 at Pueblo, the son of Earnest Adelbert and Ada Faye Peterson Cook. Known to his many friends as "Bill," he spent his childhood in Pueblo and attended Centennial High School. During World War Two he enlisted in the United States Navy, serving in the Asiatic-Pacific area. He earned 11 battle stars serving aboard the USS Taylor. Upon his discharge from military service he attended a telegraphy school. He was later employed by the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad for over 35 years, serving the Eagle, Green River, Utah, Rifle, Tennessee Pass, Sunnyside, Utah, Price, Utah and Helper, Utah stations, first as a clerk and later to become station agent. He was united in marriage with Kathleen Jones on June 6, 1948 at Rifle.

In 1970 they lived at Price, Utah, where he was station agent for 12 years and two years at Helper. They moved from Price to Clifton in December of 1982 where he had since made his home.

He was a member of the Episcopal Church; also a member of Price Elks Lodge number 1550 and a life member of the Veterans of foreign Wars, Miners Post number 2379 at Price. For many years he was a member of the Brotherhood of Railway and Airline Clerks Allied Services Division.

He was preceeded in death by his father and two brothers, Robert and Pat.

Bill passed away in Grand Junction on August 21, 1983.

DEATH OF MRS.

ELIZABETH HALLORAN.

With scarcely any warning death came to Mrs. Halloran last Sunday morning, June 4th. After a somewhat restless night, she ate her breakfast as usual, chatted in her accustomed cheerful way, anticipating and talking about her near approaching 91st birthday when suddenly her physical powers failed and she was gone. A sweet smile played upon her countenance a few moments before she expired, as doubtless visions of the glory world were opening up before her, and she would soon enter into the rest that remains to the people of God.

The funeral services were held at the M. E. church Monday at 3 p. m., being attended by a large number of friends of the deceased. Interment was made at Eagle cemetery.

Elizabeth Wright was born in Ontario, Canada, June 10th, 1814, and died in Eagle, Colorado, June 4th, 1905, lacking just six days of being 91 years of age. She was twice married. First to Mr. John McLaukkin, to which union was born one son and one daughter. Mrs. Fulford. Some time after the decease of her first husband, she was united in marriage to Mr. Anthony Halloran in the year 1845. To this union was born two sons and one daughter, Miss Alice Halloran, with whom she made her home. The three sons were taken from her by death years ago. The last union was severed by the death of her husband in the year 1880, and for 25 years she has lived in widowhood, some 22 years at Steel City, Nebraska, and about three years at Eagle, Colorado.

She united with the Methodist church in early childhood in Canada, and has ever since lived the life of a true christian, and had the enviable record of having spent her whole life in the service of God.

She was of a cheerful disposition and to the last her life was full of sunshine. Her conversation was sprightly and full of pleasantry. It was always a pleasure to meet her. She had a bright intellect, and while in late years, owing to the impairment of advanced age, mental impressions were less easily made, yet she retained the impressions of her early years to a marked degree, and would recite poems she committed to memory in her early childhood.

Both old and young were attached to her, and when she removed from Nebraska to Colorado her many friends assembled at the station and found it hard to bid her adieu.

OBITUARY

WALTER HIMES

Walter Himes was born in Manhattan, Kans., on March 7, 1862, and died in a Del Norte hospital at 1:00 p. m. on Monday, July 13, at the age of 69 years, 4 months and 6 days. He had been seriously ill for some time and Thursday of last week entered the hospital, where he underwent an operation the following day, but little hope was entertained for his recovery from the start.

The remains were brought to this city on Tuesday and the funeral services held on Wednesday at the M. E. church, Rev. G. S. Hatcher officiating. Interment followed at Hilltop cemetery. The services were largely attended by sorrowing relatives and friends. Among those from out-of-town were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Pease of Cortez, Mrs. Pease being a sister of Mrs. Himes, and C. R. Hinman and family of Farmington, Mr. Hinman being a nephew of Mrs. Himes.

When about twenty years old Mr. Himes first came to Colorado, locating at Leadville, where he was joined in marriage to Mrs. Jennie Kleckner. They resided in Oklahoma for about two years and then returned to Colorado in 1896, since which time they made their home in the San Juan Basin. They first lived at Cortez and came to Pagosa Springs the following year.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Walter Himes of Pagosa Springs, one brother, Sam Himes of Newcastle, Colo., and two sisters, Mrs. J. V. Mudge of Manhattan, Kans., and Mrs. Lucy Staley, whose address is unknown. Walter Curs of Pagosa Springs, whose mother, Mrs. Anna Nelder, was a sister of the deceased and passed away in this city a few years ago, is a nephew of Mr. Himes.

The whole community joins us in extending heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved ones.

Mrs. Ivy Keane passed away after a three week illness which was the result of a fall and a broken leg. Mrs. Keane was bedfast from the time of the accident until her death.

Ivy Keane was born February 2, 1874 at Castle Rock, Colo., to Charles and Mary Alice Fresh. Ivy Fresh spent her childhood in the Russell Springs area and at Del Norte, Colo.

On June 25, 1891 she was united in marriage to Jack Keane in that city. They moved to the Upper Piedra in 1910 and made their home there for 48 years. Mr. Keane preceded her in death in 1936 and she continued to make her home with her son, Jack Keane, Jr., on the home place.

Survivors in addition to her son, Jack, are four daughters, Mrs. Viola Weaver, Moffat; Mrs. Ivy Robbins, Farmington, N. M., Mrs. Clara Hardman and Mrs. Mary Grimes of the Upper Piedra. Seventeen grandchildren, 34 great-grandchildren and six great-great-grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon from the Community Methodist Church in Pagosa Springs, with the Rev. Elmer O'Brien officiating and interment was in Hilltop cemetery.

PIONEER RANCHER DIES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS OCTOBER 1

OCT 9, 1936

John (Jack) Kean, 69, Upper Piedra rancher, died at his ranch home Thursday morning after a few days illness from Bright's disease on October 1st.

Mr. Kean came to this section 26 years ago, where he has resided with his family ever since. During the span of years he has made an untold number of friends throughout this section of the country and will be greatly missed. Mr. Kean operated a pack train in the early days from Creede when it was a booming gold camp, having the distinction of being the first man to pack out gold from that mining camp.

John Kean was born in Richardson, Wisconsin, May 16, 1867. At the age of 18 he moved to Cotopaxie, Colo., and from there to Del Norte, where he was married to Ivy Fresh, in 1891. He moved to this section in 1910. It is our sad duty this week to chronicle the untimely death of one of the best known residents of this section, George Bud Kleckner, who died in this city at eight o'clock Sunday evening, following a long illness. The immediate cause of death was septic poisoning induced by mastoid and fistula. He had been in ill health for about a year, but last fall went to Mayo Bros. hospital, where he underwent treatment and operations, returning home greatly improved.

However, he again commenced to complain about a month ago and became seriously ill, being brought to town from his ranch on the upper Piedra last week. Every medical and tender care was given him and he improved considerably. Until Sunday it was thought that he would recover, but he suddenly grew worse and quietly passed away at the time stated.

Funeral services were held at the Hatcher chapel at eleven o'clock yesterday morning by Rev. G. S. Hatcher, and the remains were laid to rest in Hilltop cemetery. The last sad rites were largely attended, both by townspeople and neighbors of the deceased, who made the long journey from the upper Piedra section in order to pay their respects to the departed and his family.

Members of his immediate family who survive are as follows: His wife, two sons, and his mother, Mrs. Walter Himes, all of Pagosa Springs; two aunts, Mrs. Emma Thornell and Mrs. Frank Pease, both of Dolores; and one niece, Mrs. Edna Kleckner Ferguson, formerly of Pagosa Springs but who now resides at Dillon, Colo. With the exception of the last named, all were present at the funeral services. Mr. Himes, stepfather of the deceased, could not arrive from Dillon, where he is employed, in time for the funeral but reached here last evening.

Bud Kleckner was born in Keota, Iowa, on December 9, 1877, and at the time of his death was 46 years, 1 month and 11 days old. When about ten years of age he moved to Colorado, first residing at Breckenridge, Leadville and Newcastle be-

fore coming to Pagosa Springs about 1898, since which time he had made his home in this vicinity.

For several years he engaged in ranching and stock raising on West fork, where in 1906 his only brother, Ed. Kleckner, passed away. He later entered the forest service as ranger, which position he occupied for seven years, when he resigned and again engaged in ranching. He had been so occupied for the past six years in the upper Piedra section.

He was united in marriage at Pagosa Springs on March 6, 1912, to Miss Mary Keane, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Keane. To this union two sons were born, George aged 10 and Carl aged 8.

Well known throughout the county and liked by all who knew him, Bud Kleckner is going to be greatly missed by a host of friends and sorrowing relatives. To the mother, bereft of her only remaining son, and to the loving wife and children, deprived of a kind and devoted husband and father, the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community is extended in their hour of sorrow.

Thomas E. Kleckner

Thomas E. Kleckner, pioneer of Routt county, died in Colorado General hospital in Denver Friday, July 31. He had gone to the Denver General hospital suffering from a broken wrist and bruises. Later he was removed to the Colorado General hospital, and was registered as unknown.

P. R. Alsdorf went to see Mr. Kleckner at the Millard hotel in Denver where the latter had been staying and when he learned that the aged man had not returned to his room, he made inquiries at the hospitals and found him ill. It is not known how he incurred the injuries.

Mr. Alsdorf made arrangements to carry out the wishes of Mr. Kleckner in regard to his burial. The body was shipped to Steamboat Springs. A. W. Heyer directed the funeral services at the cabin home of Mr. Kleckner near Columbine. A number of his old time friends and neighbors gathered to have their last visit with Tom Kleckner, as he had wished. There were no formal services. The friends wished him God-speed on his last journey and they recounted some of their experiences with him.

The grave is at the place which he selected more than 40 years ago, under the trees in front of his cabin. He named the plot the orange grove near the Kleckner castle, 1000 Broadway, Columbine, Colo.

Among the Steamboat friends who were at the funeral were Dan Stuke, T. W. Wilson, Charles Irwin, Chris Tamm, Harrison Hapner and R. B. Dixon, all of whom prospected with Tom Kleckner at Columbine 40 years ago.

Thomas Kleckner was born in Ohio, June 20, 1851, being over 85 years of age.

Body of Thomas Edward Kleckner Discovered in the Snow, Having Died From Exposure.

Friday, March 23rd, 1906

The people of Pagosa Springs were shocked on Monday morning when a telephone message from the Chapson ranch on West Fork conveyed to them the information that the dead body of Ed. Kleckner had been found in the road by Elmer Chapson as he was coming to town. Mr. Chapson covered the body with his overcoat and returned to the house to communicate the finding of the body to the authorities over the telephone.

As the message contained no intimation as to the cause of death many people thought that probably another foul crime had been committed. Coroner Nossaman, Sheriff Hatcher and Deputy Fitton were soon on the road to Chapson ranch; others followed later. On the arrival of the officers they were soon convinced that the young man had died from exposure. The circumstances pointed so conclusively to that fact that the coroner deemed an inquest unnecessary. The body arrived in town at nearly midnight and was taken to the home of Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Fisher, intimate friends of the family.

On Sunday Ed and Bud Kleckner and Walter Himes were breaking a trail with saddle horses from the Young ranch on East Fork, where they were wintering their cattle, which they expected to move soon to the Himes ranch on West Fork. At about seven o'clock in the evening, being still several miles from the Chapson ranch, Himes and Bud returned to the Young ranch while Ed started on foot to go to the Warr ranch, opposite the mouth of Turkey creek, six or more miles distant to secure more horses and help. Bud tried to persuade Ed not to undertake so perilous a trip, all trails having been obliterated by the severe snow storm. But Ed insisted on going. After going some distance he evidently felt that he could not hold out to reach the Warr ranch and headed for the Chapson ranch by leaving the road and cutting across the point of the hill lying between the two forks of the river. He struck the road leading from the county road to the Chapson house less than a fourth mile from the house. Here, as the foot prints show, he began to wander about; at three different places he had whittled shavings, but never succeeded in starting a fire. Circumstances go to show that he had used both hands and feet in his final struggle to escape from the inevitable fate that was about to

and feet were severely frosted before he finally fell to rise no more.

Thomas Edward Kleckner was born in the state of Iowa on November 23, 1875, but has been a resident of Colorado since his childhood, and of this immediate vicinity the past nine years. He was the son of Mrs. Walter Himes of West Fork, by a former marriage.

On October 18, 1903, exactly five months before his death, he was married to Miss Jennie Warr of this county.

Deceased was an industrious young man and most highly esteemed by all who knew him. The entire community deplores his untimely end and sympathy goes out to the mother, young widow and brother in their great bereavement.

Funeral services were conducted yesterday at 2 o'clock by Dr. DeMotte at the Methodist church and many were present to pay their last tribute of respect. Interment was at Hill Top.

Lake City Air Crash Kills 2 Coloradans

LAKE CITY, Colo., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Two prominent Western Colorado ranchers were killed Wednesday when their light plane crashed into a bluff on takeoff from the air strip at Lake City.

The craft was piloted by George Kleckner, who was a Hinsdale County commissioner. His passenger was John Keane (pronounced Kane). Both men were in their 40s and owners of adjoining large ranches in the Upper Piedra section of the county.

The Lake City strip is close to the Lake Fork of the Gunnison River and has the bluff at one

end and a high mountain at the other. Witnesses said it appeared that as the plane roared down the strip, the engine was cut off momentarily, then roared ahead again at full throttle.

The craft left the ground but was unable to gain enough altitude to clear the bluff. It smashed into the hill and slid

back down, completely demolished.

Both men were dead when rescuers reached the place, which did not burn. The engine was also Kleckner's body.

Friends said Kleckner was an experienced pilot and had landed and taken off frequently at the Lake City strip. Both men were married. Kleckner was the father

of three sons and Keane the father of a son and a married daughter. The bodies were taken to Gunnison. Funeral arrangements will be made later.

Dear Mr Kleckner;-

Your father is at the Colorado Psychopathic Hospital in Denver.

He had been living at the Millard Hotel for the past years, and was taken to the Denver General Hospital July 9th and treated for fractured arm and other bruises.

On account of his being noisy and hard to control he was taken to the Psychopathic Hospital July 10th I had arranged for his removal to the Mt Airy Sanitarium July 22nd. But when went to get him found that he had fallen and broke his hip so could not be moved.

I arranged to take care of him where he is until he heals up so as to be moved.

He recognizes me, but his mind wanders frequently and he is very much perturbed over being confined to his bed.

I do not think that his condition is serious, unless pneumonia sets in from the accident.

I did not know of his first accident until I had gone to Denver not was aware of his being moved to the Psychopathic until I went down again three days later.

The only thing is that at this hospital he is receiving the best treatment and care that it is possible to get.

If he should pass out he has always expressed that he should be buried at Columbine. I write you these things so that you can be aware of it and do as you see best.

HORSE MT. RE NAMED

Horse Mountain, once the scene of silver mining activity southeast of Eagle in the Brush Creek area, is no more—as such. The mountain has a new name.

It will be identified henceforth as Kleckner Mountain—named for the man who has been steadfast in the belief that the mountain will again give up of her riches.

Mr. Kleckner, born in Aspen, came to the Eagle area when his father, Tom Kleckner was drawn by the silver strike on Horse Mt. Bill has lived here since—nearly all the time in a cabin on Bruce Creek at the foot of the mountain.

In the mid-50s, the mountain was explored for uranium—and weekend-prospectors staked out all available free land. Uranium was known to be there—but apparently not in quantities. Vanadium showed up, too.

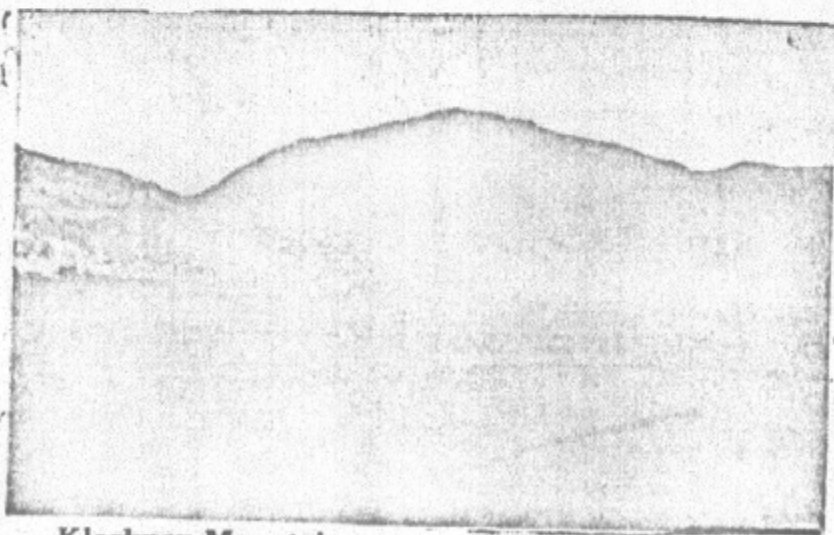
Now, the possibility of vanadium producing ore veins is being explored. The one-time silver producing mountain is under lease to

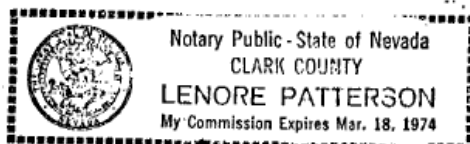
